Alton High School graduate, Angela Gray, looks to aid that process with her new book, "Help! I Have An Attitude Problem," released last month. She said the book, written for girls with attitudes that threaten their current and future social health, addresses the root of anger, rejection and pain and how these can affect a person's attitude.

This is her second self-published volume since December 2018. Her first work, "Girl, Check That Attitude!," was designed to help educators understand what young girls may be going through at home and at school, the second book is geared more toward young girls.

Both of the self-published books focus on strategies and activities to help young girls open up about their feelings in healthy and productive ways, rather than focusing on the behavior alone.



Community Outreach



From the beginning, our two major areas of community involvement were: 1) targeted volunteerism, and, 2) selective financial support to charitable organization and special cases of individual need.

We continue to expand our footprint with focus on Alton's black community, in particular...as well as the broader Alton community, in general. This is a daunting task and we realize that we cannot go it alone. As a result, we have spent the past couple of years working on building relationships and potential partnerships with other community organization that have similar missions (e.g., NCNW, CVW, 100 Black Men, NAACP). Our goal is to optimize our efforts by collaborating on areas of common interest.

We have a special focus on youth. This school year (2019-20) we are in a collaborative project with the Clayton & Virginia Williams (CVW) Foundation [www.cvwfdn.org]. The Alton School District asked for our help in addressing challenges with students of color. The big question: What do students who have difficulty in school need most to be successful? At first, our answer to this question was clear. We wanted to serve students who had disciplinary issues. However, we also realized that our approach should serve other students as well—students who were disconnected, disaffected, maladjusted, and more. Academia and public schools are spaces where people of color often feel underrepresented, unwelcome and unheard. After numerous workshops with school administrators and faculty, we reached consensus on an overarching problem: Students of color **do not feel connected** to the school or the Alton community.

We have agreed to work with the Alton Middle School focusing on three major areas to address the **connection** issue: 1) working with 'average' (unmotivated...underperforming) students with noticeable upside potential...helping prepare them for career and/or college and university entrance requirements, 2) cultural awareness (for students as well as teachers)...i.e., providing exposure to black history (local, national) that is not included in the standard curriculum, 3) self esteem...i.e., pathways to man/woman-hood. We are reaching out to organizations and individuals who have the programs and expertise to address each of these areas. A major part of our approach is to invite alumni models of success to visit specific classes to share their stories. This is just one example of helping the students make the 'connection' that is missing.
